College Foreign Language Requirement: What Is It and How Does It Work? By Kim-Ling Sun

Ever wonder why there are foreign language requirements for college?

Competitive colleges typically require at least two years of a foreign language in high school. Note that these two years must typically be in the same language.

Being fluent in another language can be especially beneficial in the tech, education, business, and law sectors, as well as in other fields that play a key role in the global economy.

To develop a campus of well-rounded students, many colleges require applicants to have completed certain general education classes in high school. Taking a foreign language is often one of these requirements, in addition to taking classes in core subjects like math and English.

There are two types of foreign language requirements for college.

The first type focuses on admission. For many colleges, you have to take a certain number of foreign language classes in high school just to be able to apply. Usually, colleges expect you to take at least two years of a single foreign language. Some competitive colleges require additional years of Language. For example: Cornell University requires 3 years of of a foreign language.

The second type of foreign language requirement is for graduation. Many majors and colleges require you to pass one or more semesters of a foreign language in college.

The credits you earn from those courses typically count toward your general education requirements. Without them, you won't be able to graduate.

Most competitive colleges have a foreign language prerequisite for first-year applicants. For example, the University of Texas at Austin requires all first-year applicants, regardless of major, to complete two credits of a foreign language.

In terms of college graduation requirements, many universities require you to complete one or more semesters of a foreign language as part of your gen ed requirements. Colleges believe studying a foreign language expands your worldview and can open doors to more careers.

Colleges that require a foreign language for graduation typically require 9-12 credits in the same language. Languages can be modern, such as Spanish and Japanese, or classical, such as Latin.

If you previously took a foreign language in high school or speak a language other than English fluently or natively, you may be able to place out of lower-level language courses by demonstrating proficiency in the language. You can do this through the IB program, by passing an AP language test, by scoring highly on your college's language placement test, or by taking and passing an additional year of a language in high school.

Each college has its own graduation requirements, so check with your academic advisor to determine whether your degree requires a foreign language.

It doesn't matter which language you take — just that you study a single language consistently. Choose a language that interests you, regardless of how popular it is.

The California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) is "All in for FAFSA/CA Dream Act" completion! CSAC is the state agency responsible for administering state financial aid. With the implementation of California Assembly Bill 469 (AB 469), we are working with your local high school to ensure your student has the resources they need to apply for financial aid for education beyond high school.

What is "All in for FAFSA/CA Dream Act"?

"All in for FAFSA/CA Dream Act" is the initiative that assists school districts with ensuring that high school seniors complete and submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or the California Dream Act Application (CADAA). Completing these applications increase students' access to financial aid, which includes the Pell Grant, Cal Grant, Community College Promise Grant, and so much more. By connecting students to critical financial aid, "All in for FAFSA/CA Dream Act" supports California's vision to increase access to higher education and connect more students with over \$3.5 billion in state-based financial aid each year.

How does this impact you and your student?

Receiving financial aid can help you and your student handle the costs associated with higher education. By completing and submitting the FAFSA or CADAA, students will be processed for federal aid (FAFSA applicants only), state aid, institutional aid, and student loan eligibility, unless the student has completed the formal opt-out process. Students will have an estimate of most of the financial aid they can receive within a short time of submitting their application. This can help with making an informed decision about pursuing a college, university, or vocational school.

Here's how we can help

We provide the resources needed for you and your student to complete the application. For this year only, the 2024-2025 cycle of FAFSA and CADAA open in late December and you should submit by April 2nd to maximize federal and state financial aid opportunities. You and your student can attend Cash for College Workshops – both virtual and in person – for free assistance with completing the FAFSA or the CADAA. The application takes just a short amount of time to fill out and you can find a list of items that you will need to complete the applications and nearby workshops here.

Who fills out the FAFSA? Students who are US Citizens, Permanent Residents, certain designations (including refugees or those who received asylum), and T Visa holders.

Why fill out a FAFSA or CADAA Application?

Before <u>each year</u> of college you must apply for *grants, work-study, and loans*. This is collectively called *Financial Aid*.

In order to be considered for federal or state funds you need to submit a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (**FAFSA**®) or **CADAA** form.

- Your college uses your application data to determine your aid eligibility.
- Many states and colleges use this data to award their own aid.
- You must submit a FAFSA or CADAA in order to qualify for the Community
 College and West Sacramento Grant.

The California Dream Act Application (**CADAA**) are for students who are not U.S. Citizens, National or Permanent residents or do not fulfill ALL of the FAFSA requirements. The DREAM application is unique to California promoting access to all students regardless of immigration statues and/or documentation.
